***IN GRANDPA'S HANDS* A BEAUTIFULLY ILLUSTRATED TRIBUTE**

In honor of Father's Day on Sunday, the book review presentation today is a children's book, but it surely relates to the fathers of Douglas County. The author notes that *In Grandpa's Hands* is a book about fathers and grandfathers, but to her, "Grandpas are the keeper of the family, the strength, the history and the wisdom of generations." In that prelude, Marlene Uhrik sums up her cleverly designed children's book that features 12 poignant pencil drawings by illustrator Barbara Cervone.

"The book was created as a result of my experience seeing my elderly dad go through a life-threatening surgery," Uhrik said. "It was the long battle to recovery that had me reflecting on what my dad meant to me and the entire family — his children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren. Through his struggle to recovery, it became more apparent who he was, not only to his family, but his friends, neighbors and the world."

She notes that her purpose in writing the book is to promote communication and emotional connectedness that comes through a nurturing relationship between children and grandparents. Uhrik has a Doctorate degree in education and is a nationally and internationally recognized children's advocate.

She has taught teachers from around the world how to inspire young children to learn and has received awards for improving the quality of life for children and families. She is currently a consultant for the California Department of Education in Sacramento, where she lives with her husband. She has two grown children and three grandchildren.

The book itself is a simple, but beautifully stated and illustrated children's story of grandpa's hands doing everyday things to which children can relate. It is told in a few words, sometimes no more than six, leading into the lifelike illustrations of Barbara Cervone, so detailed that the calloused, wrinkled hands seem to reach out to the child.

Cervone, a watercolor and oil landscape artist from Napa Valley, Calif., said she could relate to the concept of Uhrik's books "because I am blessed with nine grandchildren."

The book is 32 pages in a 9-by-9-inch square format, a sturdily made hardcover book for children ages 1 to 8. It will make a perfect gift to a child from a grandparent.

On this Father's Day I want to take you through a book called *In Grandpa's Hands*.

The 12 photos of an elderly man's hands, used for hard work, serve as keeper of the house and holder of tiny children's hands, each have a simple but moving sentence to communicate the moment.

The experience of seeing her elderly dad go through a life-threatening surgery prompted Dr. Marlena E. Uhrick to write the book. His battle to recovery made her reflect on how precious he was to the family and his friends.

Barbara Cervone was illustrator of the pencil drawings that are very lifelike. She has created paintings for public and private collections for more than 20 years.

The book starts with both hands cradling a mug, and the words "In Grandpa's hands there is a cup."

Other pages go through "In Grandpa's hands there is a diary, a feather, a trowel and continues through the pages with a flower, a bird, a starfish, a hat, a baseball, an apple, and a very old model camera. The last page shows one of grandpa's hand, covered by a younger hand and reads "In Grandpa's hands there is mine."

The book is a child's celebration of family, and the publication by White Stag Press is available today at book stores.

The author writes that the book "is designed to promote discussion of the importance of the elderly and their role in our lives and our society. It is meant to honor the simple things in life that remind us of our gratitude for the people who bring us joy and happiness."
